Securing affordable rental housing reduces the chance of <u>facing homelessness</u>, <u>housing</u> <u>instability and overcrowding</u>.

Access to safe and affordable housing is closely linked to <u>physical and mental health</u>. Renters who are <u>satisfied with their housing</u> have improved health and wellbeing outcomes.

Low-income renters living in affordable housing have increased monthly budgets to cover the costs of <u>food, healthcare and other necessary expenses</u> compared to their housing cost-burdened counterparts.



<u>Children</u> who live in affordable rental housing have higher lifetime earning potential and lower incarceration rates as young adults compared to similarly situated individuals.
